Draft your essays. Have
 your advisers and writing
 center review them. Reread
 and revise your essays until
 you are confident that they
 are stellar.

Finalize your applications

□ Research how the graduate school would like files (transcripts, essays, and recommendation letters) forwarded to them. Some have delivery systems, while others require you to upload to specific sites. □ Gather and submit your application, including admissions test reports, official transcript, letters of recommendation, and application essays, depending on what the

 Develop a contingency plan in case you don't get into any programs. This might include working, interning, volunteering, or beefing up your academic resume by taking more classes or a certificate program.
